INCOMING ARRIVAL TO WHANGAREI AIRPORT

With the predicted increase to Air New Zealand flight numbers comes the need of the implementation of Rescue Fire Services to Whangarei District Airport.

CAA require airports to have a RFS once a threshold of airline flight numbers has been met; something that our thriving regional airport has rapidly approached in 2021.

The deadline for implementation is set for 1 April 2022. This looming deadline has set in motion a flurry of planning in the WDA



management offices, first and foremost being the acquisition of the piece-deresistance of a Rescue Fire Service– the fire appliance! "It's every man's dream to have the opportunity to buy a real-life fire truck, I can die happy now." Says Bernard Luiten, Operations manager of WDA.

The Rosenbauer fire truck (pictured) is being imported from Austria and is estimated to arrive in the country mid January.

Further purchases of the relevant kit & equipment are being planned, a crew of top -notch rescue fire staff is being assembled and potential sites for a base for the service are being eyed up across the airfield.

"Our main priority is getting the bare bones of the service up and running in time. The truck can be housed temporarily in the Northland Aviation hangar and we can be based there until we organize a permanent location on the airfield." says Mike Chubb, WDA manager.

Conveniently, Mike is currently the CFO of the local Onerahi fire brigade so is well-

positioned to launch such a service at Whangarei Airport– coincidentally the original base for the Onerahi Volunteer Fire Brigade was ALSO in the Northland Aviation hangar at Whangarei Airport, so it seems to have come full circle.

Eventually, Mike & WDA management anticipate having a 6-8 person crew to man the service, and alongside crewing the RFS during AirNZ departures and arrivals, will undertake general airport duties the same as the current WDA team.

Mike also expects to eventually purchase a 4WD vehicle to add to the cohort of rescue vehicles for ease of access, but a purchase is yet to be made.

Currently based in Kensington, the lease on their current site is expiring, triggering the hunt for a new site at which to be based.
